

How to Start a Business in Hawaii

Checklist

1.	Form your business. □	
	1.1. Review Hawaii formatting options. □	
	There are 10 main types of business entities in Hawaii. Choose the one that suits you business best.	
	1.2. Name your business. □	
	After checking to see that your name does not exist, you can reserve your business name with the state	
	1.3. Get an Employer Identification Number. \square	
	Apply for an Employer Identification Number at the IRS.	
	1.4. Register your business in Hawaii. □	
	Sole proprietorships do not have to file with the state. All other business structures must file online via the Hawaii Business Express portal.	
	1.5. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. □	
	Do a search on the Department of Commerce and Consumer Affairs website to see in your business requires any special licenses/permits. If you do, apply for them online.	
2.	Register your business for taxes. □	
	2.1. Register with the Hawaii Department of Taxation. \square	
	This ensures that you can file your tax returns with the Department of Taxation.	



	2.2.	Register for income withholding tax. \square	
		All businesses with employees need to register for income tax.	
	2.3.	Obtain a General Excise Tax (GET) license. □	
		All businesses that conduct activities in the state need to obtain a GET license to	
		operate.	
	2.4.	Register for Unemployment Insurance (UI) tax. □	
		All businesses with employees must pay unemployment insurance tax on each	
		employee's wages.	
3.	Hire employees and report them to the state. \Box		
	3.1.	Report to the Hawaii Child Support Enforcement Agency. \Box	
		Report all new and returning employees within 20 days of hiring.	
	3.2.	Obtain Workers' Compensation Insurance. \square	
		Employers with one or more employees are required to carry workers' compensation	
		insurance.	
	3.3.	Display mandatory posters in your place of business. \Box	
		By law, Hawaii businesses must prominently display the required labor law posters in	
		the workplace.
