1.	Form your business.		
	1.1. Review Oregon formatting options. \square		
	There are 4 main business formation options in Oregon. Look over the types of business		
	you can register and choose one that best suits your needs.		
	1.2. Name your business. □		
	Search the Oregon business name database to see if your business name idea is free. Yu		
	should then register the name with the secretary of state.		
	1.3. Get an Employer Identification Number. \Box		
	Apply for an Employer Identification Number at the IRS.		
1.4. Register your business. □			
	LLCs and corporations needs to submit applications online to register. Partnerships and		
	sole proprietorships need to file Doing Business As forms if they are using a fictitious		
	business name.		
	1.5. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. \square		
	Search the Oregon license directory to see which permits and licenses you need, and		
	apply for them online.		
2.	Register your business for taxes.		
	2.1. Register for corporation excise tax. \square		
	Corporations and LLCs that operate as LLCs need to file for corporation excise tax with		
	the Oregon Department of Revenue.		

	2.2.	Register for corporate activity tax. \square
		Businesses with commercial activity in excess of \$1 million need to rile for corporate
		activity tax online
	2.3.	Register for withholding tax.
		Businesses with employees, and corporations that hire officers, need to pay payroll
		taxes. You can register and file online.
3.	Hire	e employees and report them to the state. \square
	3.1.	Get workers' compensation insurance.
		Employers need to purchase worker's compensation insurance from an insurance
		provider.
	3.2.	File Combined Employer's Registration. □
		You need to file a Combined Employer's Registration in order to pay employees.
	3.3.	Report new hires. \square
		You must report new hires to the Oregon Child Support Program.
	3.4.	Withhold tax from employee wages. \square
		Employers are required to withhold tax from employee wages.
	3.5.	Pay unemployment insurance tax. \square
		Most companies except for limited liability companies need to pay unemployment
		insurance tax.
	3.6.	Register for transit district taxes. \square
		Employers who pay wages for services provided in the TriMet or LTD districts need to
		pay transit district taxes.
	3.7.	Have employees complete form I-9. □
		Employees need to complete form I-9 to verify their eligibility to work in the U.S.
