

How to Start a Business in Arkansas

Checklist

1.	Form your business. \square
	1.1. Review Arkansas formation options. \Box
	There are twelve main types of business structures in Arkansas. Choose the one that
	suits your business best.
	1.2. Check name availability. \square
	The Secretary of State website includes a free business name lookup tool. Use it to
	ensure that you've chosen a unique business name.
	1.3. Reserve your business's name. \square
	Corporations and limited liability companies (LLCs) can file a name reservation request
	while they prepare to register their business. This will prevent another business from
	claiming the name as their own.
	1.4. Get an employer identification number. \Box
	There are three main filing options: electronic, fax, and mail. International applicants
	can apply over the phone. All applications should be submitted to the Internal Revenue
	Service (IRS).
	1.5. Register your business in Arkansas. □
	Almost all types of business formation documents must be submitted to the Secretary
	of State. Sole proprietorships and general partnerships don't have any such mandatory
	filing requirements but must register a trade name if using something other than their
	legal first and last names.

	1.6. Obtain necessary permits and licenses. \square
	Discover Arkansas offers information about which occupations are licensed at the state
	level. Your local small business development center can offer guidance in this regard,
	too. You should also check with them to find out which local licenses and/or permits
	you need, and then proceed to apply for each of them.
2.	Register your business for taxes. \Box
	2.1. Sign up for taxes via the Arkansas Taxpayer Access Point. \Box
	Arguably the easiest way to apply for most taxes is via the Arkansas Taxpayer Access
	Point (ATAP). For example, businesses with employees can use to register for income
	withholding tax, and those who provide specified goods or certain services can register
	for sales tax.
	2.2. Register for unemployment insurance tax. \square
	Businesses that have employees must register to pay unemployment insurance tax.
	You'll need to create an online account with the state's Division of Workforce Services.
3.	Hire and report new employees. \Box
	3.1. Report your staff to the state. \Box
	This applies to newly hired and rehired staff, whether permanent, temporary, or
	seasonal. Reports must be submitted to the Arkansas New Hire Reporting Center.
	3.2. Obtain workers' compensation coverage. □
	Almost all businesses that employ three or more individuals are required to offer this
	form of coverage.
	3.3. Display the mandatory posters and notices. \Box
	Federal and state laws dictate the posters you will need to display in your workplace.
	You will be able to find these online.
